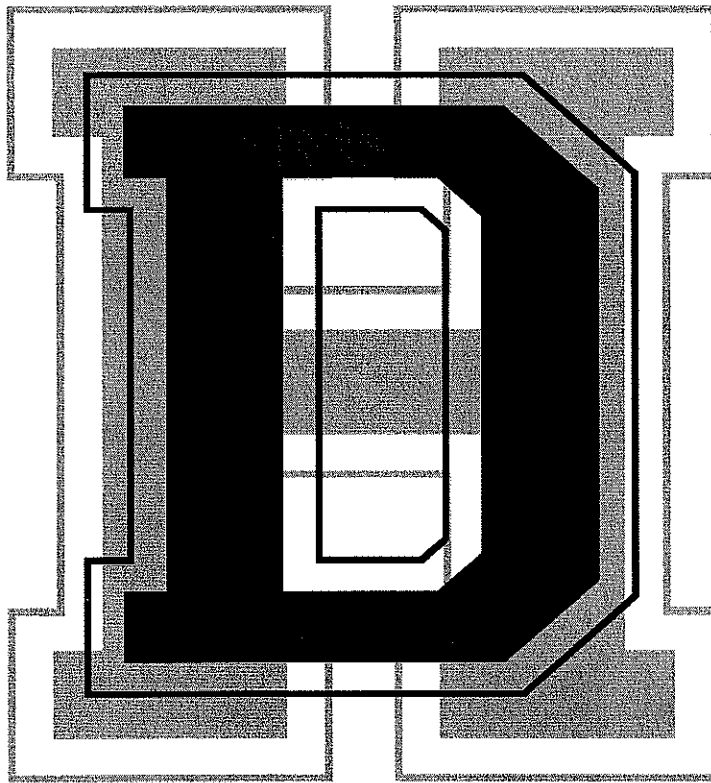

MADISON

Madison is a growing community along Long Island Sound with a population of approximately 17,700. It was rated the "Number One Small Town in Connecticut" by *Connecticut Magazine*. Similarly, it was rated by *Boston Magazine* as one of the Top Five "Quintessential New England Towns" and was featured in the *New York Times* as one of the "ideal places to live" in the Northeast. The articles cited factors such as the superiority of the school system, performance on standardized tests, school and community spirit, the town's economic profile, and the new high school. Madison's close proximity to major cities makes it an attractive location for highly educated and skilled professionals.

DANIEL HAND HIGH SCHOOL

Daniel Hand High School is a four-year comprehensive public high school, grades 9 - 12, with an enrollment of approximately 1,200 students. Each year more than ninety percent (90%) of the senior class continues their education at the post-secondary level. The school is accredited by the New England Association of Schools and the Connecticut State Department of Education.

FACULTY

The high school teaching staff includes 120 members: 1 with a Doctorate degree, 70 with Master's degrees, and 26 with Six Years. Thirty-two are trained as mentors. Included in the staffing profile are 3 administrators, a district director of guidance, an athletic director, 11 department head/coordinators, a library media specialist, 5 school counselors, a student assistance counselor, a social worker, and a school psychologist.

COURSE LEVELS

There are three levels of instruction in some academic disciplines. Recommendations are made by teachers in conjunction with counselors, parents, and students. Honors / Advanced Placement sections receive level 1 credit.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

The National Honor Society offers admission during both junior and senior year. Consideration in either year requires a comprehensive review of the candidate's contribution to the school community in the areas of academics, service, and leadership. Every faculty member is offered the opportunity to comment on a student's potential candidacy.

A nationally recognized program that enables students to receive community college credit.

MAGNET SCHOOL PROGRAMS

Daniel Hand High School students may participate in partial day programs at the *Educational Center for the Arts* and the *Cooperative Arts and Humanities High School* in New Haven. *The High School in the Community* offers a full-time program for a select group of students.

HIGHLIGHTS OF DHHS: CLASS OF 2008

Daniel Hand High School has been awarded the Silver Medal of Excellence from US News & World Report as one of the top 500 high schools in the nation.

The Junior Classical League won many ribbons at State Latin Day. Latin II and III students won gold, silver and bronze medals on the National Latin Exam and prizes in the State Latin Contest.

The Varsity Math Team took 1st Place overall in their league for the third year in a row. Awards included top scoring Senior and Junior.

As part of an award winning music program, students have participated in All-State Band, Orchestra, and Chorus. At the Virginia Beach Music Festival, Advanced Chorus won 2nd Place, Waes Haeil Madrigals won 1st Place, and Show Choir won 1st Place. Other awards included Best Overall Mixed Choir, Best Overall Choir, Best Soloist, and Best Instrumental Section.

DHHS has a full interscholastic award-winning Class M athletic program with 29 sports, including 2 cheerleading teams, 3 club sports, a flag squad and an award winning marching band. DHHS has won 18 Class MM Michaels Achievement Cup Awards, and in 2006-07, was named the state's overall winner of the Michaels Cup. Since 1985, the Michaels Achievement Cup has been the standard of excellence for high school sports programs in Connecticut. Daniel Hand was also recognized in 2005 as the best Athletic Program in the state of Connecticut by Sports Illustrated Magazine. In addition, DHHS sports teams have won 69 division championships, 50 conference championships, and 43 state championships.

Grade Point Average at Daniel Hand High School is calculated using all courses without regard to level. No additional weighting or points are added for Honors or Advanced Placement courses. We use a four-point scale (4.0) as outlined below:
